



UPEISU In the Community

An increased community impact for the UPEISU as an organization can be measured by our positive and increased media presence concerning items such as the Brown Court Fence, Sex Week, Get Out The Vote, Public Transit on Sunday, and many other initiatives. With a dramatic increase in articles, radio pieces, and TV interviews, the UPEI Student Union had a more impactful media presence than ever this year.

Working with groups like PEI Marathon, Women's Network PEI, and the City of Charlottetown, the UPEI-SU was successful in working with key stakeholders in the community to increase awareness and bring improvements to a variety of social issues. Each of these collaborative relationships helped bridge the UPEISU membership with the greater PEI community.

With support of PEI Marathon, the first annual OutRun Stigma event took place and brought students, staff, faculty, and other community members together to address the importance of Mental Health by raising awareness and money that went to replenish the UPEISU Mental Health Initiatives Fund.

Along with Women's Network PEI a poster campaign titled #OurUPEICommunity was launched featuring students from across campus and a quote that brought attention to sexual assault. The series of posters aimed to increase awareness and prevention and it was followed up by a daylong workshop where community members gathered to discuss the issue and the resources available to help tackle the issue.

Another issue that was address regarded the blocking of a publically-paved pathway which had heavy foot traffic as it connected a city neighborhood to a local bus top and the UPEI campus. This caused great concern for many student and residents in the neighborhood who relied on the pathway for easy and safe access. The City of Charlottetown and the UPEISU worked together to remove and newly-installed fence and were successful after a 2-month negation period.

Overall, the 2015-2016 school year saw an increase in overall visibility and community presence for the UPEISU.

Diamond Awards

The Student Union worked with the UPEI administration to develop the Diamond Awards. These awards provide recognition to students who contribute positively to student life and to the greater community. The UPEI SU secured a \$10,000 annual commitment for the award, which will ensure that up to 20 awards are available each year. The award categories cover four areas: campus spirit, health & wellness leadership, sustainability leadership, and educational leadership. With this awards program focusing on accomplishments outside of the classroom rather than academics, there is now a new avenue to recognize exceptional students who may otherwise not have been recognized.

Policy & Advocacy Update

From the office of the VP Academic & External

This was an excellent year for the UPEI Student Union in terms of advocacy and policy development. The year began with an incredible Get out the Vote campaign in September and October which led to the creation of the Advocacy Team (a new communications team geared towards raising student awareness about Student Union advocacy). The Advocacy Team was able to make students more aware than ever what their Student Union was doing for them in meetings with the University and the Government by creating videos on our priorities, giving classroom presentations, and consulting the student body though our annual feedback session.

The other committee I had the pleasure of working with this year was the Academic and External Affairs Committee. The Academic and External Affairs Committee created and distributed a survey assessing UPEI students' thoughts on the George Coles bursaries and the distribution of dollars associated with that government program. We had almost 400 responses on that survey and it was determined that a large number of students want to see the same amount of money every year from the provincial government rather than different amounts every year. The committee also determined the policy priorities for the 2016-2017 academic year.

In policy development, new external policies were added pertaining to developing a 12 month course timetable and granting credit to international students for the completion of the English Academic Preparation Program, as well as the beginnings of a policy on adopting a Fall Reading Week.

The Student Union had an incredible year on the advocacy front as well. Throughout continued lobbying efforts with the Provincial government following the election, the UPEI Student Union succeeded in changing government policy. The Government of Prince Edward Island expanding the eligibility requirements of the Graduate Mentorship Program, and raised the weekly maximums on student loans with an index to inflation. The Student Union also got a public commitment in the Throne Speech to establish a multi-year funding agreement with public post-secondary institutions. This was definitely one of the most successful years the organization has had in advocacy.

Campus Trust

From the office of the VP Finance

I had the pleasure of serving as a trustee on the Campus Trust board this year, meaning that I was a representative for the Campus Trust as a whole and not just for UPEI. The Trust had another great year. Things are looking extremely promising for future years. Before serving as VP Finance, I have never been a part of something where all of the work was 100% for the students and the Campus Trust is that and more. The PBAS team is fantastic to work with us and help ensure that decisions are made in the best interest of our constituents.

My work with the Campus Trust basically began my first week in office for the SU as I began the process of learning about the role that I played and how the whole system works. This year we were able to offer online opt outs, which helped reduce traffic at the beginning of the year and better streamline the process. We were still able to opt students out in person, but this helped to ease the burden on Candice, our Administrative Coordinator, as well as her admin assistants. This also served as an opportunity to spread the word and educate these students on the benefits of staying on the plan and how they could stack their original plan with ours for even better coverage.

This year PBAS provided each school with a recommended range as to what level they should be keeping their reserves at. This number was based on previous claims and student population size expected to remain on the plan. I am happy to say that we fell exactly in the middle of this range, which means that our plan is performing as it should. This is fantastic because we already offer the plan with some of the most comprehensive coverage out of any other school. Out of our reserves, we were able to put together a mental health initiative fund for UPEI students to apply for any events that would promote mental health on campus.

I attended the Campus Trust AGM in Toronto with the rest of the representatives in January. It was a great meeting and covered the entire six months since the last in-person meeting in June. At this AGM, we renewed our investment manager for the Trust and listened to presentations on the future of health practices.

It was a privilege to work with the Campus Trust this year and I am eager to see what great things they will continue to do for students in the future.

Clubs and Societies

Expansion and Development

What a year! This academic year saw the introduction and expansion of many exciting components of the clubs and societies atmosphere and culture on campus. We had a record-breaking amount of ratifications this academic year with a total of 63 officially ratified clubs and societies on campus!

I had the pleasure of introducing the Future Executive Development Program, an initiative geared at teaching first-year students the skills necessary to become a club executive. Thus far, this program has had great success and I am excited to see where it will go in the future.

Early in the year, the UPEI SU Council approved the creation of a new office position: a Clubs & Societies Coordinator. This new position will enhance the way we work with societies by providing extra detail and attention to how our societies operate on campus and acting as the main point of contact for all ratified clubs and societies.

With the help of the new Clubs & Societies Coordinator, I was able to develop a Society Strategic Plan that will shape the Student Union's future direction in regard to clubs & societies for the next three years.

Finally, we saw the revamp of our sub-organization bylaw, which now allows clubs and societies to ratify earlier and also provides SU benefits to clubs & societies operating out of the Atlantic Veterinary College.

I am extremely proud of the accomplishments that clubs ϑ societies saw this year and am excited to see even more development in the years to come.

Communications

Never a dull moment!

The Communications department buzzed with change this past year from position transitions to content platform restructure. In the Spring of 2015, Nouad Mourad was hired as VP Communications for the 2015/2016 year. In August, Nouhad resigned from this position due to other opportunities available to her. Shortly before the school year began, Alexandra Heighington, VP Communications of the 2014/2015 year, generously stepped in as Interim VP Communications and was subsequently selected as the VP Communications for the full year.

In November 2015, Alex presented her resignation to the Student Union Council to allow time to put her efforts into schoolwork and grad school applications. As voted on by a referendum in the Fall 2015 Election, the VP Communications position was due to transition into a Director of Communications role. After Alex's resignation, it was determined by council to begin this new position early. In January 2016, Brenna Doucette was hired as the Student Union's first Director of Communications.

In April, the Student Union proudly launched a new website designed by Hi There Designs. At the same web address (www.upeisu.ca), the new site provides quicker and easier access to important information and news with a fresh, sleek look. We are extremely excited about this fresh online presence for the organization.

Aside from the Student Union's website, our social media presence has continued to thrive comfortably. We have over 500 new likes on our Facebook page and an average of 35 additional Twitter followers per month over the past year. Our Instagram and Snapchat accounts have also grown considerably in popularity on campus and in the greater Charlottetown area.

Throughout the year, the Student Union has increased our online presence through the creation of original media (like information videos and written releases), more frequent surveys and feedback opportunities, live-tweeting of events, and our thriving biweekly newsletter.

Looking forward, I am optimistic that the office of communications will continue to positively represent the Student Union in creation of original media and content and maintenance of ongoing platforms.

Campaigns

The UPEI Student Union campaigns from this year included Shinerama, Get Out the Vote, Sexual Assault Awareness, Movember, Sex Week, and Mental Health Week.

Shinerama is a national campaign that raises money for cystic fibrosis research in Canada. In 2015 UPEI raised a total of \$15,822 in support of this cause.

In September and October of 2015, the Canadian Alliance of Student Association (CASA) launched the Get Out The Vote campaign, which was a student-led initiative to persuade students to vote in the October 19th federal election. The UPEI Student Union was one of twenty-three student associations across Canada to participate in this campaign. The results were very successful with 1134 pledges to vote on UPEI's campus and 42,000 pledges nationally.

The UPEI Student Union aimed to raise sexual assault awareness and prevention through the launch of the #OurUPEICommunity poster gallery. Each poster featured a different UPEI student along with a quotation regarding the issue. Other efforts included the SU teaming up with the Women's Network PEI and UPEI Student Affairs to provide workshops such as Bringing in the Bystander training and How Not To Be That Guy.

Movember took place during the month of November to raise money and awareness for men's health and prostate cancer research. Events included a multi-venue event, a casino night, a hypnotist, and a "MO.V.O. Fest" Drake theme-night at the Wave.

Sex week was an exciting week in February of 2016, which gave students an opportunity to openly talk about sex and sexual health. Monday through Friday, there were information sessions available to students including an STI clinic available in the health centre, Bringing in the Bystander training, and sex trivia in The Wave.

Mental Health Week was a weeklong campaign in March, hosted by various groups across campus. Through the Mental Health Initiatives Fund, the UPEISU granted funds for initiatives such as the "Zen Zone," which was hosted in the Day Lounge and gave UPEI staff, faculty, and students a space to relax and take a break from the stress of everyday life.


